During the floods of January 1996, Mark Cox began his service with the Sunbury Fire Department. Over the years, he has responded to hundreds of calls for help as well as served as the editor of the semi-annual fire department newspaper, Hot Spots. As chairman of the department's Memorial Committee, Mark and his committee annually provide a dignified service as a tribute to those who have passed. As a teacher at Shikellamy High School, he encourages students to get involved in volunteer service. From food drives at the high school to the penny collection his students did for the Children's Miracle Network, Mark shows that being a volunteer is fun. In 2004, Mark ran the NYC Marathon to raise money for 9/11 charities and ran the 2005 Marine Corps Marathon to raise funds for the family units of a deployed PA National Guard unit.
